

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## Sacramento day trip Midtown

Why go now: Sacramento's happening Midtown has spawned perfect-for-December hot spots with great eats mixed right in with the shopping, so you can warm up and refuel as you go. Where is it, again? On Sac's easy-to-navigate street grid, Midtown stretches from 16th to 29th Streets; businesses cluster on J, K, and L. Not your grandpa's Sacramento: In Midtown, the city's suited-up political life gives way to an unbuttoned art and literary scene. Prezzies worth picking up: Treasures old and new, like vintage wear (I. Magnin silk blouse, Bakelite bangles) at well-curated Bows & Arrows (1712 L St.; 916/444-3606) or any record you can think of at the Beat (1700 J St.; thebeat sacramento.com). For hostess gifts or stöcking-stuffers, hit sweet, petite Ginger Elizabeth Chocolates (closed Sun; 1801 L St., Ste. 60; gingerelizabeth.com) to pick up gorgeous infused bonbons or a salty cocoa-nib brittle bar. Break time: Soothe holiday nerves with a steaming cup at mod Hina's Tea (2319 K St.; hinastea.com), with more than 350 teas.

### Getting to Midtown

From U.S. 50, exit at 15th St.; head north on 16th. From I-5, exit on J St. and head east.

#### 3. A touch of la dolce vita

**SHOP** At **Hot Italian,** flip through racks of Italian-designed cycling and motorcycle wear (think Dainese tops and modish jackets) and ogle the Vespas and other scooters.

**SNACK** A few pizza-topped tables amid the racks lead to a dining room where Naples-style pies come blister-crusted out of the gorgeous tiled oven. We're partial to the Magnini, lush with smoked salmon and mascarpone, and the sweet Murino, with gorgonzola dolce and pears. \$\$; 1627 16th St.; hotitalian.net



### 4. Something for everyone

**SHOP** Hit Midtown's epicenter at 20th and J for a collection of urbane shops and eateries housed in the new, open-air **MARRS** complex. You'll find stretchy gear at **Asha Yoga** and stocking-stuffers from retro candy to hundreds of magazines at compulsively browsable **Newsbeat**.

**SNACK** Go for bubbles and bites at vibey **Lounge on 20**, fresh-squeezed margaritas and tortilla soup at updated taqueria **Azul**, or a cheese and pepperoni at **Luigi's Slice** (a new outpost of a local 1950s pizza institution). 1050 20th St.; marrs-sactown.com

### Make it an overnight

A few blocks from Midtown lies one of Sacramento's newest hotels, which also happens to be its most fun. The Citizen Hotel, in a thoroughly updated 1925 building, riffs on government culture with political cartoons in every room. It's primarily a business hotel, so you'll find steep weekend discounts handy for shopping trips. Don't miss breakfast with housemade sausage at Citizen's eatery, Grange.
